



# YOUTH EMPOWERMENT STRATEGIES FOR SUCCESS LOS ANGELES



The Foundation for California Community Colleges' Youth Empowerment Strategies for Success – Los Angeles (YESS–LA) program aims to help current and former foster youth transition successfully into adulthood. In Los Angeles, nearly 2,000 foster youth are emancipated each year. Studies show that as many as 50 percent of emancipated foster youth become homeless, have serious money problems, or end up incarcerated. To better prepare foster youth for independence, YESS–LA was developed in 2007 by the Foundation and funded through the Los Angeles Department of Children and Family Services.

## Coordinated Resources

The YESS program services bring together local campus and community resources to provide services that address the specific concerns foster youth face at different points along their path. Approximately 1,240 young people between the ages of 14 and 20 will access the two contracted program services (tutoring and life skills

training) during the 2011–12 program year. Since 2007, YESS–LA has served close to 5,000 youth.

## Continuum of Service

The YESS program subcontracts with seven Community College campuses in Los Angeles County. Foster youth and former foster youth are referred to the program by Los Angeles County Department of Children and Family Services and probation staff of transition coordinators. Participants and their caregivers receive in-home visits, one-on-one mentoring, academic assessments, and access to web-based and local resources. Depending on their age, participants also receive tutoring (ages 14–15) or life skills training (ages 16–21). The program's end goal is for participants to pass the California High School Education Examination (CAHSEE), graduate high school, begin earning a college degree or technical certificate, and understand and gain the skills needed to be self-sufficient and gainfully employed.

## The Empowerment Message

The YESS Program's 3Rs (Rigor, Relevancy, and Relationships) communicate a positive message that says: "YESS, together we can empower youth to better understand the impact of their choices, access post secondary education, build permanent relationships with caring adults, and obtain the skills, knowledge, and resources needed to succeed."
